Building Bonds: Understanding Community Engagement vs. Attachment

Are you trying to enhance the engagement of your community in various areas? This workshop will explore the interconnected roles that engagement and attachment concepts play in fostering strong, resilient communities. Community Engagement focuses on active participation, where individuals contribute to and influence local initiatives, projects, and decision-making processes. In contrast, **Community Attachment emphasizes the emotional** bonds and sense of belonging that individuals feel towards their community, often driving their longterm commitment and loyalty. The session will highlight how fostering both engagement and attachment can lead to more vibrant, cohesive, and supportive communities, encouraging participants to leverage these concepts in their work or personal lives.



Stanford Marshmallow Experiment, Then and Now

The 1960s Stanford Marshmallow experiment tested young children's ability to delay gratification by offering them a choice between an immediate reward and a larger reward for waiting. However, more recent studies and research have revealed that the topic is more complex than originally thought. There are many strategies we can use to help children develop self-control and understand its connection to long-term success. This workshop aims to share effective methods and emphasize the importance of waiting.

Car Seat Basics for Educators and Home Visitors
